An Introduction to Opera

This series introduces the art form opera to those who have not understood (or liked) it before.

We will explore its early roots in ancient cultures (Egypt and Greece), with a look at resurrected music from Greece, and look at the early attempts to get it off the ground in the Renaissance. A quick listen to excerpts from The Marriage of Figaro (both classical, and buffo opera), then on to romantic opera (Carmen) then excerpts from La Traviata, (the beginnings of the style which explored human relationships, rather than conventions.) This led on to the Verismo style, in which Puccini excelled. The last 2 sessions will be a look at Puccini's lifestyle (a soap opera in itself), with examples from Tosca and La Boheme.

Indigenous Australians, European Colonization, and "Scientific" Racism: Lessons from our history.

This series examines the concept of "scientific" racism, a pseudoscientific philosophy popularized in 19th century Europe. A useful tool for helping colonial authorities to dispossess and marginalize local people, it has proved to be pervasive in our modern history as illustrated in the noteworthy 1955 Australian film, "Jedda, the Uncivilized". European maritime expansionism was underpinned by an idea of what it meant to be "civilized" and a belief that the world was wild, disordered, unused and need of "civilizing". This separation of nature from humans raises questions about the consequences for nature itself, indigenous people, and settler Australians.

Michael Prince. Michael worked at Murdoch University for 22 years, originally as the Co-ordinator of Murdoch's Aboriginal bridging program. For the last 12 years, he taught and was the Academic Chair of Murdoch's Australian Indigenous Studies program, and taught undergraduate and master's level students on a wide range of issues and topics relating to Australian political history, Indigenous popular culture, social justice, and the intersections of Indigenous-versus western philosophies of human/nature relationships
