This month: Christmas reads - with a couple of 'Who Done it's' on the list.

First a weighty tome:

"THE PUNISHMENT SHE DESERVES" by Elizabeth George

I have to confess up front that I am an Elizabeth George follower so bear that in mind.

I find that the cleverly ingenious plotting, the psychological observations evident in her characters outweigh the sheer volume of words she uses to tell her stories. I love nothing better than to settle down and get stuck in. I am always intrigued by the character development, carefully build in the story. So many novels have skeletal character in the rush to have action, action, action. Take time and enjoy a good read with George's most loved characters Havers and Lynley.

"THE WIFE AND THE WIDOW" by Christian White

Set on an island in the dead of winter the atmosphere builds quickly in this very Australian story. It is told from two perspectives. Kate a widow how discovers her husband had a secret life and Abby, an island local who is forced to confront the evidence that her husband is a murderer. Both women set out to discover the truth about the men in their lives and that quest pushes them to the edge as the plot twists and turns. A great read. Christian White also wrote "The Nowhere Child" – another good read for when you finish this one.

"ELEANOR OLIPHANT IS COMPLETELY FINE" by Gail Honeyman

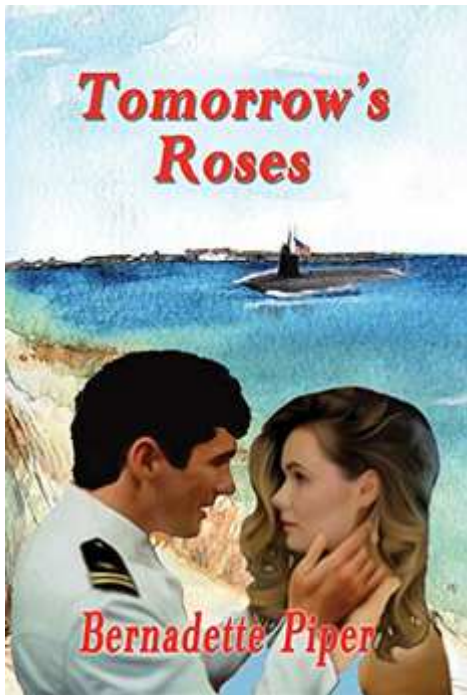
